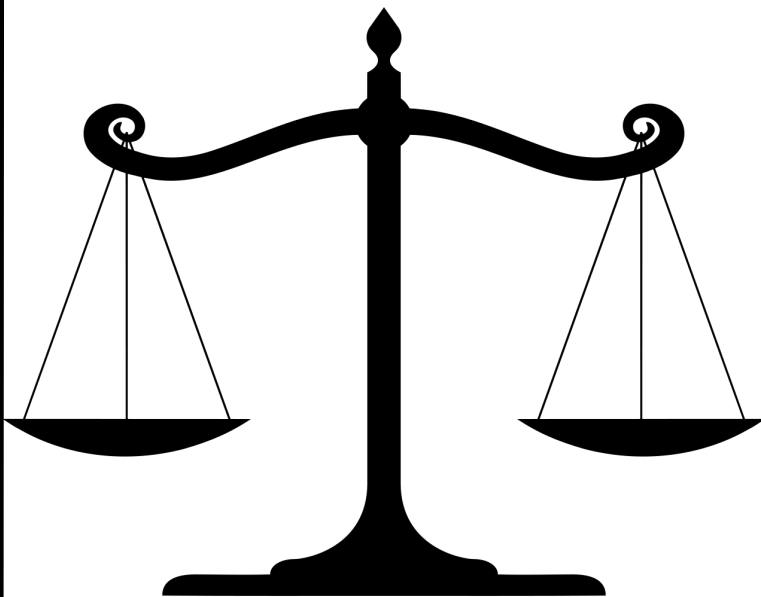

Listening for the voice of God is not easy. The first reading from the book of Samuel reminds me of a time in my discernment for the priesthood. At the time I was confused about what God wanted from me. I was about to finish college seminary and was pondering whether I should continue, pursue religious life or even leave seminary. I had a mix of feelings, and I was not sure how to understand them. I needed to hear God's voice.

Very often we want God to give us an answer. One of my friends once remarked to me that she wished God would just come down out of heaven and declare himself. The trouble is that we don't really know what we are asking. We are usually unprepared for the thing we suppose we want God to say. It would be too much for us to bear. In time we realize this, but at the moment it does not seem so. We learn to have faith that God will speak and listen when he does.

In the first reading Samuel has not yet learned to recognize the voice of the Lord, so each time that he heard God's voice, Samuel ran to the priest of the Temple Eli. Samuel has to do this several times until Eli realized what was happening and instructed Samuel to respond, "Speak Lord for your servant is listening." At the time when I encountered this reading in my discernment, I was listening for God's voice. I spent time in the chapel every day in addition to our community prayers. However, I felt that I had not received a response. Then, in the middle of this turmoil in my life, I experienced this reading while serving as an altar server for Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament at Abbey Youth Festival. Like Eli, I encountered the Lord that evening. I learned that through the struggle God was with me.

How do we learn to hear God's voice? That is a difficult question to answer because there is no one definitive answer. I have found that we often hear God the clearest in the middle of great trials. I believe that this is because in the middle of great trials we listen. We know that we need God and we listen. I believe this was the case for me as I sat in the sanctuary of Abbey Youth Festival, adoring the Lord. I knew that I needed God, and I knew that he would answer. What I remember most from that time was how my heart was beating faster. It is hard to describe except I knew that this reading was for me. In the middle of a huge crowd, God had a message just for me. It was overwhelming. God really did care about my struggle. God broke through my deafness.

If I have one thing to share about learning to hear God's voice, it would be perseverance. In retrospect, I can see how God has used trials to teach me. I can also see the times he was trying to save me trouble or help me when I didn't listen. What has personally helped me the most is to trust that God hears me when I pour out my cares to him and to expect that he will respond. That response is not always in time frame that I want, but it always comes.

God desires to have personal relationship with every one of us. However, as in ordinary life, relationships take two willing partners. Relationships also take time. They take communication and even struggles in order to mature. Please continue to pour your self out to the Lord. In fact, keep a journal of it so that in time you will be able to examine what change has taken place.
