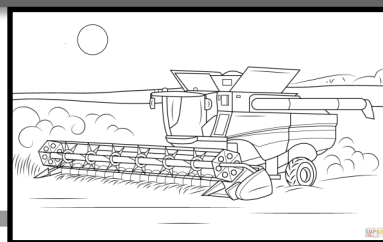

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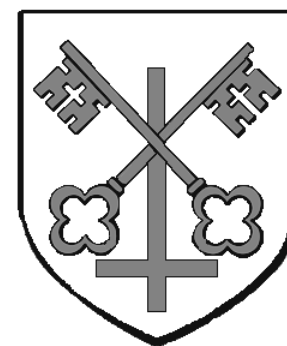

Imploring Help From Heaven

And Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" And the blind man said to him, "Master, let me receive my sight."

Mark 10:51

God provides for all his children, but he expects that we ask. In the gospel of Mark (10:51) Jesus heals Bartimaeus only after he asks for it. In the first book of Kings, King Solomon observes that God has made him king, despite his youth. He found the task overwhelming and cried out to God, "Give your servant, therefore, an understanding heart to judge your people and to distinguish right from wrong" (1Kings 3:9). God wants us to ask in order that we participate in the answer. Praying invites us to a participation in the action of God. He is capable of acting without us, but He desires our participation.

God provided for his servant Solomon. God ordained for him to be King of Israel to succeed his father. Solomon's asking God for wisdom pleased God because Solomon did not ask anything for himself, but rather for what is necessary to fulfill his vocation. This pleased God because through praying in this way Solomon is fulfilling his vocation. God is pleased when we pray for what is necessary to fulfill our vocation because it is a blessing not only for us, but for all.

When we talk about consecration it is also necessary to ask. It is true that God can bless us without asking, but the choicest blessings are reserved for those who ask. The reason is that God desires that we participate in the process. Solomon is praiseworthy because he wants to be a good king. What are we seeking through consecrating our town? Are we praying like Solomon not for silver or gold, fame or honor, but to seek to fulfill our mission as a Christian community? Our preparation (if you will, our asking) is important because it demonstrates to God our seriousness. Through asking like blind Bartimaeus and Solomon we prepare our hearts to receive the blessing.

As we seek to implore God to bless and consecrate our town, we should ask ourselves if we treasure the Kingdom of Heaven. It is incredibly disingenuous to implore heaven for blessing and then use this blessing only for our selfish gratification. Let us ask ourselves, "Do we treasure Heaven? Do we treasure God? Do we value the things which are important to God?" We treasure many things (family, wealth, hobbies and many other good and not so good things). Where does God fit in our priorities. Is He first? Does He fit at all? Do we expect God to compete for scraps of our attention? All that we have is a gift. We do not truly own the things which we call 'ours'. Truly these things are given to us by God who expects us to be a good steward. At the end of time when all are called to account will we be able to say to God that we used our talents and belongings for the Kingdom of God, or for our own selfish gratification?

It is important in the consecration to pray that God look upon our lowliness. It is often the case that we seek to do God's will, but fail. Maybe we believe, but we struggle to put God first. God is not blind to our needs. Put yourself in the shoes of Bartimaeus. What will you ask Jesus for? I think I would pray like Solomon. I would pray that God remember that he called me to a vocation (priesthood) higher than myself and that I require his help in order to fulfill this vocation. I would also pray like Bartimaeus that I may see. I want eyes to see things as God does. What does He want for the Parish, what does He want for His people, what does He want for me? As I am mindful of my own consecration as a priest and a servant of Jesus and Mary these are the prayers which I offer to God.

I pray that each one of us come to God as we are. The truth about the goodness of the saints is not how great they are, it is how poor and lowly they become. The saints humble themselves before God and seek His help. I pray that we do not hide our weakness, but that we come as we are seeking His help to repent and become the people He calls us to be. As God did not turn away Solomon or Bartimaeus He will not turn us away. May we rise like Bartimaeus not to seek our own will, but to become disciples of Jesus.
